

Pay Equity - - Next Equal Pay Day: April 18, 2018

A key component of financial fitness and independence is the ability of women to achieve pay equity. Since its founding in 1881, AAUW has been committed to promoting equity for all girls and women.

Pay Equity continues to limp along for women and men to receive equal pay for equal work. When equity was first tracked in 1963 (the year I graduated from high school yep, I am over 21) women received 53% of what men received, and before starting business in 1970 I worked for others and know I did not receive equal pay but little was said about it. According to the National Committee on Pay Equity (started in 1963) 2015 women's average earnings were \$40,742 & men's \$51,212 or 79.6% of men. We do better in CA and have a task force; here is the link for more information:

Here are the 2017 dates for women working to equal the pay of men; note that Native American and Latina Women are still working this year to equal men's pay:

March 7 – Asian-American Women's Equal Pay Day (85%)

April 4 – Traditional Equal Pay Day (80%)

July 31 – African American Women's Equal Pay Day (63%)

September 25 – Native American Women's Equal Pay Day (59%)

November 2 – Latina Women's Equal Pay Day (54%)
