Equal Pay Day - Wear Red-March 31

The next Equal Pay Day (EPD) is Tuesday, March 31, 2020. This date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The National Committee on Pay Equity https://www.pay-equity.org/day.html reminds us to wear red to symbolize how far women and minorities are "in the red" with their pay. This is a great idea for branch members working EPD tables in their communities or at local colleges.

AAUW's publication *The Simple Truth* update is based on the most recently released data from the U.S. Census Bureau. In 2018, women received just 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man. Women of color often face a wider gap: compared to white men, Black women make 62 cents on the dollar, and Latinas make 54 cents on the dollar. The pay gap has only decreased by a nickel in the 21st Century. For more information on the Gender Pay Gap, and ideas for EPD events, check out https://www.aauw.org/resource/how-to-equal-pay-day/.

On the National Level, the *Paycheck Fairness Act* passed in the House of Representatives and languishes in the Senate with no action yet taken. The Equal Pay Act requires that men and women be given equal pay for equal work in the same establishment. The jobs need not be identical, but they must be substantially equal. It is job content, not job titles, that determines whether jobs are substantially equal. Specifically, the EPA provides that employers may not pay unequal wages to men and women who perform jobs that require substantially equal skill, effort and responsibility, and that are performed under similar working conditions within the same establishment.

According to WAGE (Women Are Getting Even), women earn one million less than men in their lifetime. AAUW has facilitated *Start Smart* and *Work Smart Workshops* to help close the gap, and you can learn more about these workshops at the website: https://www.pay-equity.org/day-kit.html. AAUW now offers an online one-hour Work Smart Workshop accessed from the AAUW.org website, for salary negotiation skills.

"You've Come a Long Way Baby" ...But You're Not There Yet!

Perhaps many of you will recall the Virginia Slims advertising slogan from the late 60's, "You've come a long way, Baby." This slogan aptly fits the rise of the feminist movement in America which most of us agree dates back to the Seneca Falls, NY convention in July 1848.

August 26, 2020 will mark the 100^{th} anniversary of the passage of the 19^{th} Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, the culmination of the Women's Suffrage Movement. It took over seven decades for a woman's right to vote to be guaranteed as the law of the land.

Since then, we have seen successive waves of the Women's Rights movement. Activists in the 1960's and '70's sought equal rights and opportunities along with greater personal freedom for women, similar to the goals of the suffragists, the first wave of feminism. But this second wave of feminism also encompassed every area of women's experience -- including politics, work, the family and sexuality. Major legislative victories were accomplished during this period: the Equal Pay Act, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, Legalization of birth control for married and unmarried couples, Title X Family Planning Program, Title IX, the Rove v Wade decision and passage of the ERA. Third-wave feminists sought to question, reclaim, and redefine the ideas, words, and media that have transmitted ideas about gender, gender roles, womanhood, beauty, and sexuality, among other things; while Fourth-wave feminism refers to a "resurgence of interest in feminism that began around 2012 and is associated with the use of social media." The focus has been on justice for women and opposition to sexual harassment and violence against women. The movement is "defined by technology," according to a British feminist, and "is characterized by [social media tools] that challenge misogyny and further gender equality." Issues in the forefront include street and workplace harassment, campus sexual assault and rape culture. Scandals involving the harassment, abuse, and murder of women and girls have kickstarted movements such as the "Me Too" Movement.

Where will feminism go from here? We've still got our work cut out for us as well as some unfinished business: namely the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, which has now obtained approval by the requisite 38 states, and faces court challenges or perhaps a legislative solution; and the ratification by the U.S. Senate of the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), the international bill of rights adopted by the United Nations in 1979. AAUW has played a notable role in all these waves of feminism and I am sure will continue to do so as we strive for social and economic justice-- because we're not there yet.

This park is tucked in the hillsides and valleys between Laguna Beach, Laguna Niguel and Aliso Viejo. The underdeveloped refuge has 2 major stream-fed canyons, sandstone formations, caves sculpted by wind and water, aged groves of live oaks and sycamores. Along the way, the trail passes a Cave Rock, a 26 million-year old sandstone formation and Dripping Cave also known as Robber's Cave. This overhanging shelter was used as a hideout to rob stagecoaches en route from San Diego to Los Angeles. Hiking distance - 5.7 miles round trip, elevation gain 150 feet, hiking time 3 hours.
