Edward Humes

The Forever Witness:
How DNA and Genealogy
Solved a Cold Case
Double Murder



Edward Humes is a Pulitzer Prize – winning journalist and non-fiction writer. He has authored 14 non-fiction books, including the bestselling Mississippi Mud, No matter How Loud I Shout, Baby E.R. and a Man and his Mountain.

Mr. Humes will be discussing his new book, The Forever Witness: How DNA and Genealogy Solved a Cold Case Double Murder. His book covers (1) the 1987 brutal murders of Tanya Van Cuylenborg and Jay Cook, and (2) the history and impact of combining DNA analysis and genealogy. The combination revolutionized the solving of cold cases, current violent crimes and identification of Jane and John Does.

For educators in our Branch, in 2001 Mr. Humes spent a year teaching a writing workshop at Whitney High School, Cerritos, CA. His observations while at school led to his narrative non-fiction book, School of Dreams (2004). Further, his book, Garbology, is a popular selection for the First Year Experience Program on college campuses.

How Did Huntington Beach AAUW Start?

Charlene Bauer was the force behind initiating AAUW in our area. The Penny Saver newspaper was her vehicle for gathering potential members. The Penny Saver was read by everyone in the early 1960's, and Charlene's \$1.25 ad seeking women interested in AAUW was effective. About 100 women responded! Charlene became the first president of the Huntington Beach AAUW Branch in 1968, for a two-year term.

The early meetings were held at members' homes. Childcare was often provided for daytime meetings. Evening meetings began later in a bank meeting room. Huntington Beach was sprouting with new housing, and young women were looking for opportunities to meet with others and do things for their new community. Monthly meetings with speakers and discussions led to long-term friendships.

Charlene was also on the board of the library as it was being developed, and she was active in the preservation of the wetlands and the League of Women Voters. In 2002 she was named Huntington Beach Citizen of the Year.

Together, Charlene and Ralph Bauer were leaders in the cultural and governmental structure of Huntington Beach. Ralph, a member of the City Council and a thoughtful contributor to civic life, passed away on July 12, 2022.
